Nailing the Basics (Prime Areas of Learning)

- Talk, talk! When you are at home, talk about the books you are reading, the
 characters, their experiences and what you like about them. Encourage your
 child to talk in longer phrases and if they don't, repeat back to them what they
 said in a full sentence to show them how to speak.
- To prepare your child for Reception please ensure they do not nap in the day time. It helps to keep bedtime the same time each evening. Some parents have found making a visual timetable with their child helps structure their day.



• Try to take your children outside for exercise at least once a day. It is very important for their physical development, but also crucial for their mental health to experience life outside their home.


Maths

- Practice counting up to 10 and down again. Can your child fetch you 5 shoes? 7 cars?
- Make your own zoo-animal number line up to hang in their room.
 Choose what animal to make for each number. Draw or let them draw the correct number of animals for each number.
- Play this card matching memory game. Use the language "top, bottom, left, right, up, down, middle" to discuss where the matching pair is.

• Oxford Owl – Key books this week are:





- Discuss with your child the pictures, how many zoo animals can they find in the book. Do they have any other books with zoo animals in? Go on a hunt!
- Can your child follow the words with their finger from left to right as you read?
- Two of these books have rhyming words. Part of phonics is hearing and recognising rhyme. Continue rhyming strings e.g. "dog, bog, log". Make up funny rhymes e.g. "David, Bavid"
- Mark of the week vertical lines. Remember pencil grip, large and small movements. Maybe these could be the bars of the lion cage!

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This week our theme is:

Under the Sea

Week 2 - 8.6.2020




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- Take your children outside for exercise at least once a day. It is very important for their physical development, but also crucial for their mental health to experience life outside their home.
- Play catch with a large ball or even a pillow to develop hand-eye coordination.

Maths

- Cut out underwater animals from a plastic food container or similar to play with in the sink or bath. Have a game trying to catch them with a spoon or similar utensil. Line them up. How many did you each catch? What is the total altogether?
- Sing 1,2,3,4,5 once I caught a fish alive
- Cut out squares, triangles rectangles and circles. Use them
 to make a under water picture. Help them use positional
 language like "rotate, flip, above, below, left, right, top, bottom, next to." You
 could even make similar pictures together with this online activity.

Literacy

• Oxford Owl – Key books this week are:





- Discuss with your child the pictures, before you turn each page ask them what they think will happen next. Can your child follow the words with their finger from left to right as you read?
- Play with how sounds we hear changes in different places underwater the world of sound is very different experiment at bath time? Play with putting your hands over our ears or pinching your noses. Make all the sounds in the alphabet which change and which stay the same?
- Mark of the week wavy lines. Remember pencil grip, large and small movements. Maybe these lines are waves in the sea, or where the fish are swimming! Make a wavy sea picture full of sea creatures!

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This week our theme is:

At the Farm

Week 3 - 15.6.2020



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• Don't forget to practice name writing and recognition. Not only is it important for their self-identity, but when your child returns to school this will allow us to use their independent work.

Maths

- Make a farm shop. What things in your cupboards could you buy at the farm?
 Put price tags 1-10p on it together.
- Play with some real money with your child. What will they buy in your shop? Can they recognise some of the numbers and the digits written on the coins/notes/bank cards?
- Use the words "How much?" "Change." "Pay." "What would you like?" "Please" "Thank you."





Literacy

Oxford Owl – Key books this week are:



- Discuss with your child the pictures. Focus on retelling this week. Can they remember what has happened so far? Can they remember what the characters say? How do they say it? In an angry voice? A sleepy voice?
- Can your child follow the words with their finger from left to right as you read?
- This book has repeating ideas. Why not make your own version. "Who can help me lay the table?" "Very well" said daddy, "I'll do it myself!"
- Mark of the week circles with anticlockwise movements many letters need this. These circles could be the bodies, heads, eyes of farmyard animals.

Understanding the World

- Discuss which animals are farm animals. Which animals wouldn't be well suited to the farm? Why? Why do farmers keep animals? Are all the animals for eating? Can you find out what their jobs are at the farm? How do they look after them? Where do they sleep?
- What else do farmers produce? (crops)
- Talk about similarities and differences between yourselves, other people and different animals. Which farm animals are big and which are small? Look at real photos of them to see.
- Play a guessing game. "My farm animal has floppy ears, it likes mud, it has a curly tail... it is a... pig!"

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This week our theme is:

Pets

Week 4 - 22.6.2020





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Try to take your children outside for exercise at least once a day. It is very important for their physical development, but also crucial for their mental health to experience life outside their home.

Maths

- Dogs need exercise every day. So do we! Go on a walk and see how many animals you can spot. Bring a piece of paper and record together how many of each animal you see. Which of these animals are pets? Use the language of quantity more/most/less/least to compare the number of animals you found.
- Use toy animals (or pet pictures) and hide them in the home. Go on a hunt for them using positional language (behind, under, above, on top, below) to help your child find the naughty missing pets.
- Play this game to collect things dogs need. Make sure you look at the
 instructions and talk about what all the things are and why they are good and
 bad for dogs. Keep pausing the game halfway through so you can talk about
 the number of items they have collected so far.

- Before reading these books talk with you child about what might happen in the story. Is the pet being a good pet or a naughty pet?
- Discuss with your child the pictures, what they think will happen next.
- Can your child follow the words with their finger from left to right as you read?
- Mark of the week vertical lines. Remember pencil grip, large and small movements. Maybe these could be the bars of the lion cage!
