

Here are the results, by data, of the HRE Policy Consultation with Parents which took place in the summer term 2021. In addition to the graphs there are boxes for the decisions made by the Governing Body. These decisions have finalised the draft sections of our HRE Policy which is published on our website.

Please note that the governing body agreed to rename the policy **Health and Relationships Education Policy (HRE)**. This is in line with the DfE expectation about what is taught in primary rather than secondary school.



Q1. What year and class group is your child/children in?


The consultation

- The survey was open for 3 weeks in summer term 2021
- It was communicated to parents via text, emailed letter with links to the website where everything (letter, policy, Jigsaw overview and the survey) was easily available. We also sent a reminder text and letter after half term.
- We were always available to meet with parents:
 - We have met individually with several parents and will continue to do so as requested/as part of the policy
 - We have received 5 emails

The parental response to the survey: numbers

- 148 responses. We have 621 pupils in 421 families so this represents 35% of our families.
- Where we didn't receive a response ie. 65% of families, we could perhaps assume that these parents don't have sufficiently strong views they want to share and are happy to defer to and trust the Headteacher and Governing Body to ensure that all children at Woolmore receive a high standard of education to enable them to learn and to become informed and respectful global citizens in the future.






Governing body decision


We will teach puberty to all pupils in Year 5. As the borough recommends puberty in Year 4 we will offer an opt-in lesson about starting periods to girls in Year 4. It will be parental choice whether their Y4 daughter attends this lesson.

Governing body decision


There were a range of viewpoints about when and whether to include human reproduction lessons

Parents have the right to withdraw their child from these lessons.



Governing body decision


We will teach the names of some private body parts in Year 3. It is important that children have the vocabulary to confidently report medical or safeguarding concerns by the end of Year 3.


We plan to teach the NSPCC Pants programme from Y1 so that children understand that 'what's in their pants is private'

Governing body decision

Most parents said they wanted personal hygiene taught. This will be taught in the HRE curriculum as part of Physical Health and Mental Wellbeing.

We won't teach FGM but we will make sure that staff knowledge of FGM is strengthened through our safeguarding training.

Response

We had 49 responses in this section. 70% of survey respondents said they didn't have further questions or comments.

School response to issues raised in the last 2 questions

- We will always teach all aspects of the HRE curriculum with sensitivity and understanding of the children at the forefront of • what we do.
- All staff will have additional training and support to make sure that all lessons are well planned, resources are appropriate, and the children are learning in a caring and sensitive manner.
- All teaching will be factual with no promotion of any family structure over any other; key information will be given, and • difference valued equally.
- We are always happy to share the resources we plan to use for lessons. Please ask. •
- We will send letters home and invite parents to view our resources and/or discuss the lessons about puberty (Y5&6) and human reproduction education (Y6 with opt-out) with teachers. We have always done this and will continue to do so.
- We will not be using any photos, images or film footage to teach any aspects of puberty or human reproduction education. • We know it would be inappropriate to use anything deemed as explicit.
- We will only use diagrams or simple pictures and these can be shared with parents before the sessions. •
- Puberty will be taught in single sex groups by experienced teachers.
- We will always be available to talk to parents about any concerns they may have.
- Our named lead staff member for HRE is Hannah Williams, AHT Inclusion and Safeguarding.
