





<p><b>Carnivore</b></p> <p>An animal that eats only meat.</p> <p>For example, wolves, snakes, toads.</p>		<p><b>Predator</b></p> <p>Hunts, kills and eats other animals.</p> <p>Fox</p>		<p><b>Why do humans and most animals have skeletons?</b></p> <p>To provide support and shape for bodies. To protect important parts of the bodies such as our organs (heart, lungs etc)</p>		<p><b>Camouflage</b></p> <p>The ability of an animal to disguise or conceal itself within its environment.</p>	
<p><b>Herbivore</b></p> <p>An animal that only eats plants.</p> <p>For example, giraffes, cows, sheep, deer.</p>		<p><b>Prey</b></p> <p>Is hunted, killed and eaten by other animals.</p> <p>Rabbit</p>		<p><b>What jobs do our muscles do?</b></p> <p>They help move our skeleton. They also help our heart beat and protect other organs.</p>		<p><b>Food chain</b></p> <p>A series of living things that rely on each other for food.</p>	
<p><b>Omnivore</b></p> <p>An animal that eats plants and animals.</p> <p>For example bears, monkeys, hedgehogs</p>		<p><b>Producer</b></p> <p>An organism which makes (or produces) its own food</p> <p>Plant, for example, Grass</p>		<p><b>Do any birds of prey live in London?</b></p> <p>Yes! Peregrine Falcons now live in London. There are around 30 pairs of birds who have made London their home.</p>		<p><b>Mammal</b></p> <p>A warm-blooded animal with a backbone whose body is usually covered in hair or fur, which produces milk for their young. Examples include humans and dogs.</p>	
<p><b>A food chain</b></p> <p>Grass → Rabbit → Fox</p> <p>Producer      Herbivore      Carnivore</p>		<p><b>Food Chains</b></p>				<p><b>Habitat</b></p> <p>The natural home of a plant, animal or other organism.</p>	
						<p><b>Scavenger</b></p> <p>An animal that feeds on the dead bodies of another animal it has not killed.</p>

<p><b>Bengal tigers:</b> India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Bhutan and Burma.</p> <p><b>Siberian Tigers:</b> Eastern Russia, Northeast China, Northern North Korea.</p>		<p><b>Lions:</b> Africa (south of the Sahara) and the Gir Forest in India.</p>		<p><b>Foxes:</b> mainland Britain and Ireland, Europe, North America, Asia and North Africa.</p>		<p><b>Peregrine Falcons:</b> nearly everywhere on earth except for the highest Mountains, Polar regions and tropical rainforests.</p>

<b>Physical features</b>	Natural features such as rivers, grass/fields, trees/forests, hills, beaches




A bird's eye view (using Google Earth) of Woolmore school and the local area around it. Which human and physical features can you see?


